# I. Legal Framework of PID and PNGD

PID	PNGD

## II. Theoretical Background: Bio-Politics (Foucault)

- » all rational modes of governance that relate to the **population** as a whole
- » focuses on the vitality or life of the population
- » associated with **empirical knowledge** about the population: e.g. birth rates, sexualities, life expectancies, mortality rates, health and hygiene, migration rates
- » administers, organises, manages, controls, creates incentives, monitors, increases and organises the population on the basis of knowledge gained through empirical as well as political economist research
- » aims at improving the life and health of the population
- » pro- and anti-natalistic regulatory frameworks



## II. Theoretical Background: Necro-Politics (Mbembe)

- » focuses on **dying** and **death** of certain people/groups of people/under or in certain circumstances or locations (e.g. plantations, camps, occupied territories, terror)
- » some people appear as the living dead or as homines sacri (Agamben)
- » wants to show that some people live well because of other peoples' dying
- » anti-natalistic regulatory frameworks



## III. Disucssion: PID and PNGD as Bio-/Necro-Politics

- » PID and PNGD: knowledge as prerequisite for the decision to (non-)transplant the embryo/ or maintain/terminating the pregnancy
- » biopolitics " [...] delegates to the individual most directly concerned the task of using his or her body *sensibly." Memmi*, Social Research 2003, 652
- » termination due to a possible severe disability til beginning of child-birth-pain vs three months after becoming pregnant → what is sensible for a pregnant person within the concrete society/context?
- » non-inculsive and non-barrier-free society + individualistic liberal career-oriented biography → national authorities are not pressured to establish an inclusive society as demanded by the UN-Convention on the Rights of persons with disabilities
